WPB Programmatic Grants in the College of Human Sciences

The Women's Philanthropy Board grants programmatic funds that respond to various needs in the College of Human Sciences. The following initiatives and programs have received 2014-2015 WPB grants:

WPB Faculty International Development Grant - \$10,000

WPB is providing \$10,000 in competitive grant funds to assist College of Human Sciences' faculty members in developing study abroad experiences for undergraduate and/or graduate students.

Undergraduate Peer Advising Program - \$2,000

The Undergraduate Peer Advising Program enhances the academic advising process by providing trained student peer advisors to assist two professional academic advisors during peak registration and advising periods for approximately 1,400 students in the College of Human Sciences.

"Dress and Dine for Success" Etiquette Dinner - \$1,450

Thirty College of Human Sciences students will attend a "Dress and Dine for Success" etiquette dinner to assist them in becoming more comfortable with presenting themselves in a professional manner.

Connecting with Family & Consumer Sciences High School Teachers - \$750

A professional development workshop will be held to support teachers in Alabama high school Family and Consumer Sciences programs. WPB funding will support a one-day workshop on Auburn's campus which introduces the teachers to the programs in the College of Human Sciences.

This is Human Sciences DVD - \$5,000

The WPB is providing the CHS Office of Academic Affairs funding to enhance its recruitment efforts by producing a DVD which will highlight the academic programs and unique opportunities available through the College.

Faculty/Staff and Student Campaign Matching Grant - \$1,500

The WPB is providing funds to provide a matching grant to those CHS academic units who reach 100% participation in the 2014 Faculty/Staff Campaign. In addition, WPB is providing funds for a challenge grant to the CHS unit who generates to highest level of participation in the 2014 Student Giving Campaign.

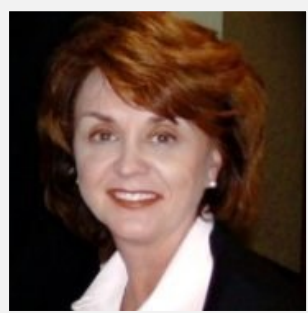

Remembering Lee Cannon

Founding Women’s Philanthropy Board Benefactor Donor

Lena “Lee” Ferrara Cannon, 95, of Auburn died Friday May 9, 2014, at her home. During her many years of service as an assistant professor of nutrition, at Auburn University and throughout her retirement she was known to the Auburn community as a “culinary luminary.” To many she was simply "the hostess with the mostest," because of her love for entertaining. In addition, Lee served on the CHS Dean’s Board of Advisors and was a founding Benefactor Donor to the Women’s Philanthropy Board.

Mrs. Cannon, a 1940 graduate of West Virginia University, first taught at Osage Junior High School in Osage, West Virginia, and later attended a graduate program at the University of Wisconsin, where she studied under legendary nutritionist, Dr. Helen Tracy Parsons. Mrs. Cannon met her future husband, Bob, on campus and married after his graduation, just ten hours short of her PhD. She never had any regrets. The newlywed Cannons ended up in Auburn in 1948 when Bob became a professor of animal and dairy science.

In 1955 when Auburn's Extension Service changed its image with the newly created Alabama ETV, Mrs. Cannon found herself hosting the long-running “Today’s Home.” Over the years Mrs. Cannon hosted many well-known guests, including actor Vincent Price, comedian Bob Hope, pediatrician Dr. Benjamin Spock, and fashion designer Nolan Miller. At a Women in Radio and Television meeting in NYC, not only did she interview Ginger Rogers, but, she and Bob were asked to dance in her penthouse.

Over the years Mrs. Cannon also wrote food columns for the *Montgomery Advertiser* and the *Columbus Ledger-Enquirer*. She authored three books: *Today’s Home: Ideas from Lee Cannon*, the *Southern Living Quick and Easy Recipes* cookbook, and the textbook *Menu Celebrations*. In retirement, Mrs. Cannon stayed active with involvement in numerous activities, both locally and nationally.



Every year Mrs. Cannon attended the annual CHS International Quality of Life Awards (IQLA) Banquet in NYC, through which she met her distinguished colleague, Julia Child. In 2010 at the 17th annual IQLA banquet, Mrs. Cannon was pleased to get a “shout-out” from PBS’s president and CEO Paula Kerger. Kerger told Mrs. Cannon she had been “wanting to meet her for a long time” and later told the audience, “Lee Cannon had the longest running home show in history on public television!” Kerger's comments were later dittoed at the podium by veteran journalist Bill Moyers and former Alabama Governor Bob Riley.

Mrs. Cannon once told a friend, “Stay active, keep busy, and always do your own housework!” This philosophy, plus her energy, enthusiasm, and generosity to those around her were the secret ingredients of her longevity.

Mrs. Cannon’s professional and philanthropic legacy are carried forward by her family. Granddaughter, Samantha Allbrook, serves as the Director of Educational Programs and Operations for the Cary Center for the Advancement of Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies and is a WPB Associate Donor. In addition, her daughter, Leigh Allbrook is a founding WPB Business Partner and her son-in-law, William Allbrook, is a founding member of WPB’s The Phils.

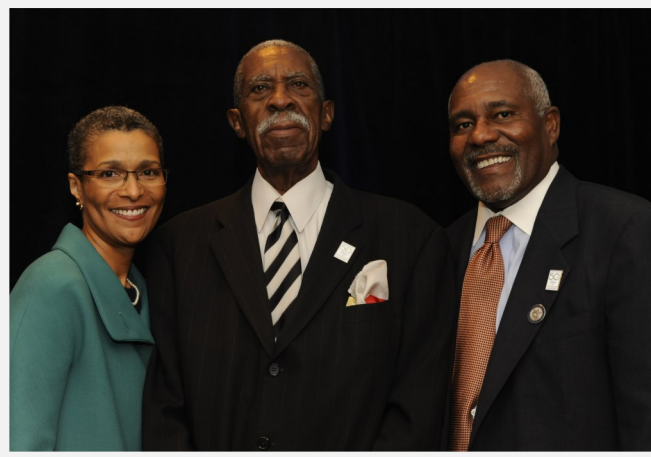

Thom Gossom was Auburn football's first African-American walk-on in 1970, and was the first African-American athlete to graduate from the university. **Marybeth Gasman**, director of the Center on Minority Serving Institutions at the University of Pennsylvania led the colloquium which focused on philanthropy in the African-American community.

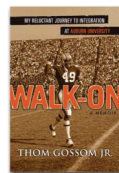
